Brazil's former leftist president, Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva, has sealed an astonishing political comeback, beating the far-right incumbent Jair Bolsonaro in one of the most

significant and bruising elections in the country's history.

With 99% of votes counted last night, Lula, a former factory worker who became Brazil's first working-class president exactly 20 years ago, had secured 50.8% of the vote. Bol-sonaro, a firebrand who was elected in 2018, received 49.1%.

On Paulista Avenue, one of the São Paulo's main arteries, ecstatic Lula supporters gathered to celebrate his victory and the downfall of a radical rightwing president whose presidency produced an environmental tragedy and saw nearly 700,000 Brazilians die of Covid.
