A good journalist needs to report the facts about a story. They should know which sources are reliable and question those that seem unreliable.

- What do I know about them?

Asking these questions can help us decide whether a source is...




Panic in Berlin as police search

Wild boar chase



A police force in Berlin has said that the 'lioness' they were searching for is likely a wild boar.

The search started after a video was shared online that seemed to show a lioness at the side of a road. It took 36 hours and involved helicopters, drones and over 300 officers.

Although police believed that the video may have been a lion, some experts were not sure. Local zoos, museums and circuses said that none of their animals had escaped.

People across the city will be grateful that they are able to leave their houses again after being told to stay inside. An outdoor concert was cancelled and local nurseries were told not to let children outside.

The story caused a lot of discussion and mischief. Several fake videos and images were shared online while a group of teens played lion roars through speakers during the search. The police said this was very unhelpful at the time.




